Daily Assignments

There will be works assigned to students daily or every other day. This may include reading, journals, writing, and independent research. Students must complete all daily assignments on time to receive credit unless otherwise arranged with Ms. Scannell. Daily assignments will account for 20% of the total quarter grade.

Unit Tests/Quizzes

Students will take frequent reading quizzes that may consist of multiple choice, short answer, or essay questions. At the end of each unit, students may receive unit tests. Unit tests may also be a combination of multiple choice, short answer, and essay questions. Unit tests/quizzes will account for 25% of the total quarter grade.

Compositions/Projects:

Students will be expected to write frequently in this course. Writing may take the form of short papers, blog/forum posts, journals, and unit tests/quizzes. Students will also complete 1 comparison & analysis paper for any two novels used in class. At the end of the course, students will be asked to complete a portfolio that will showcase their work throughout the semester. Students will present their best work to the class. We will review and practice various styles of writing throughout the semester. Student compositions/projects will account for 30% of the total quarter grade.

Daily Oral Language/Vocabulary:

In order to improve upon grammar skills, students will participate in daily oral language. We will also be focusing on expanding our vocabularies throughout the semester and will have vocabulary assignments as well as quizzes. Daily oral language/vocabulary will account for 25% of the total quarter grade.
